The Senate Committee on Post Office and Civil Service concluded its executive consideration of H. R. 7977, to increase postal rates and salaries of Federal employees, and ordered the bill favorably reported to the Senate with amendments.

The Committee approved the House provisions granting 6 percent pay increases to postal employees, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ percent increases to other Federal employees.
